


The World Cup (Women's)

Shavuot

We recently celebrated Shavuot! A



time of Torah and sacredness, of holiness and remembrance, of dairy and cheesecakes. Shavuot is when Moses climbed up Mount Sinai to receive the Ten Commandments. It's also when Jews had to follow the commandment of eating kosher which is why we eat so much dairy, including cheesecake.

On Shavuot we celebrate the Torah, because this was the time we received the Torah. At first God wanted to tell the Israelites the commandments in person. A huge storm broke. Thunder rumbled and lightning rolled across the sky. Then God's booming voice rang out. But the children of Israel were so frightened that some of them became very ill. So God called Moses up Mount Sinai to receive the Ten Commandment's written down. It took Moses forty days and forty nights to receive the Ten Commandments, just like Noah was forty days and nights in the ark during the flood. In the end the Israelites got bored. They thought Moses was never coming back. Moses had left his brother Aaron, the high priest, in charge, and when the children of Israel complained to him, he said, bring me your gold and jewels and your necklaces and rings, your diamonds and silver and your rubies and jewellery.' The Israelites did as they were told and Aaron used fire to melt all the gold and carved it into the golden calf. The children of Israel danced round it and bowed to it and offered sacrifices to it.

But eventually Moses did come down. When he saw the golden calf, and the people dancing and singing round it, he was so angry he threw the tablets onto the ground where they shattered. God was angry and Moses pleaded and begged him not to destroy the Israelites. Instead, God demanded that Moses receive the entire Torah plus the Ten Commandments, and rumour has it that the children of Israel were so excited at the Torah that they stayed up all night studying it and slept the next day. That's why it's a tradition to stay up all night studying the Torah on the first night of Shavuot.

Shavuot is considered one of the most important festivals ever, because there were only three Jewish holidays when the Israelites brought offerings of fruit and barley to the

temple, the Mishkan. The offerings consisted of wheat, apricots, plums, pears, lambs and cattle, bulls and cows. There was also a lot of dairy offerings, which is another reason why we eat dairy on Shavuot. There were even more dairy offerings than usual on Shavuot, because the Torah had told the children of Israel to be kosher and they were eager to obey.

On Shavuot you might hear your parents discussing going to a night lecture on the first night of Shavuot, or flicking through cheesecake recipe books. Shavuot for some is celebrated for three days, from Saturday, eight of June, at twilight, to Monday, tenth of June, at dusk. For others it end on Sunday, ninth of June, at sunset. You may wonder why it always begins or ends at evening. The truth is, all Jewish festivals start the night before traditionally, like Friday night is Shabbat, but Saturday is the official Shabbat day. Doesn't it feel like Friday is the last day of the week rather than Sunday? Purim, Sukkoth, and Rosh Hashana all begin the night before, but not Chanukah! Pesach does too, with the Seder to celebrate the evening. So if you're Jewish, you can count your birthday starting the night before!
