possible as Russia expands the invasion. Many Ukrainians are fleeing Kiev, if not the country. They are fleeing to the neighbouring countries such as, Slovakia, Poland and Lithuania and have become refugees there.


on olympics.com and look at replays from the games in Beijing as well as a calendar and a medallist chart.

We recommend this movie for all ages but especially 7+. You will enjoy singing and dancing along to this musical extravaganza!


Overall this is an amazing movie and it is rated 5 stars.




Puzzles Page
